

Buy what at I don't grow at Settler's Farm. I don't know of other places.


It's more expensive, but we buy local when we can.

- It's the best!


- Better for the planet and my local economy. Often more expensive but not always.

Please define "food security" so I may answer. How can one provide food security fairly?


I am retired so I have little increase in funds each year but will reduce amount of food eaten to continue buying locally.

How can a food hub help you?


- It's a big ask and lots of parts
